JUDGMENT

DEPUTY BAILIFF: We have taken time because we have read the whole of the statements under caution, including the question and answer interview records and we have read the transcript of the Police Court proceedings. We must sentence on the offences to which pleas have been accepted by the Crown

and not on suspicion. We do that, but we have taken into account all the circumstances surrounding the offences. We are satisfied that the sentences asked for by the Crown properly reflect the respective parts proved to have been taken or admitted by each of the three accused. We are satisfied, too, that the sentences asked for properly reflect both the aggravating factors and all the mitigating factors. Accordingly, Muir, on Count 1, you are sentenced to eighteen months' imprisonment; Rowley on Count 1A, you are sentenced to twelve months' imprisonment; and Lawlor, on Count 1A, you are sentenced to nine months' imprisonment.
