JUDGMENT

5 THE BAILIFF: Corcoran, come and stand at the Bar. When the Court
sentenced you on 18th July, 1997, I told you that you had
previously had a good work record and the Court hoped that it
would not see you again, but that you were at the top of a
slippery slope and we hoped that you would progress no further
10 down it. Sadly, you have done so and the Court has considered
very carefully sending you to the Young Offenders' Centre. That
would be a pity from your point of view. It might affect your
employment prospects. It would certainly affect any travel plans
that you might have. because many countries do not accept people
who have undergone sentences of detention.

15 We are not going to do that, but we are not going to allow
the Order to continue as if nothing had happened. We are going to
revoke the Order and we are going to deal with you in a slightly
different way. What the Court wishes to say to you, Corcoran -
and this is very important - is that you must learn that if you
fail to obey the Orders of the Court there will be consequences.
20 We are going to revoke the Order made on 18th July, 1997, and we
are going to substitute another Order that you attend for 18 hours
at the Attendance Centre and the first such time - subject to the

5 Manager confirming that the Centre is going to be open - will be 2 p.m. tomorrow, Saturday, 11th October, 1997. It is very important that you attend at that time tomorrow and it is very important that you attend on the future occasions that the Attendance Centre Manager tells you to be there. If you come back before this Court then it is likely that you will suffer a custodial sentence.
