**Prohibition of the Sale of Rod Caught  
Salmon Regulations (Northern Ireland) 2013**

*Made* - - - - - *29th April 2013*

*Coming into operation* *1st June 2013*

The Department of Culture, Arts and Leisure (1), makes the following Regulations in exercise of the powers conferred by section 26(1)(jj) (2) of the Fisheries Act (Northern Ireland) 1966 (3) and now vested in it (4).

**Citation and commencement**

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Prohibition of the Sale of Rod Caught Salmon Regulations (Northern Ireland) 2013 and come into operation on 1<sup>st</sup> June 2013.

**Prohibition of sale**

2.—(1) Subject to paragraph (2), a person shall neither sell nor offer nor expose for sale salmon caught by rod and line in any fishery to which section 25 of the Fisheries Act (Northern Ireland) 1966 applies.

(2) Paragraph (1) shall not apply in relation to salmon so caught before the coming into operation of these Regulations.
