SUBSTITUTION of the legatar's children was thought implied;—and therefore Robert Walker having disponed his effects to William Walker, and in case of his death without children, ordered him to pay certain sums to different persons, and *inter alios* to Mary and Janet Walker, without adding their heirs or assignees; these died before William, but left issue: The Lords found a substitution to their children implied.
