The United States Chargé d'Affaires to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs

My Lord,

London, August 28, 1963.

I have the honor to refer to the Agreement between the Government of the United States of America and the Government of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland relating to the disposition of equipment and materials effected by the exchange of notes signed at London on the 10th and 13th of May, 1957(1), as amended by the exchanges of notes signed at London on the 17th and 30th December, 1958(2), and on the 7th and 10th of November, 1961(3).

As a result of the recent discussions between representatives of our two Governments, I now have the honor to propose that the terms and conditions of the said Agreement, as amended, shall be extended to apply to machine tools furnished by the Government of the United States of America to the Government of the United Kingdom under the Mutual Defense Assistance Agreement between the two Governments on the 27th of January, 1950(4), or the Mutual Defense Assistance Act of 1949, as amended and supplemented, or pursuant to the Economic Co-operation Agreement between the two Governments of the 6th of July, 1948(5), as amended, or the Mutual Security Act of 1951, as amended.

If the foregoing proposal is acceptable to the Government of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, I have the honor to suggest that the present note and Your Lordship's reply in that sense should be regarded as constituting an Agreement between the two Governments which shall enter into force on the date of Your Lordship's reply.
